

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
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OS X Accounts

Administrator



An administrator can add and manage other users, install apps, and change settings. The new user you create when you first set up your Mac is an administrator. Your Mac can have multiple administrators. You can create new ones, and convert standard users to administrators.

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
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
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Standard



Standard users are set up by an administrator. A standard user can install apps and change settings for his or her own use. Standard users cannot add other users or change other users' settings.





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
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Managed



Users who are managed with parental controls can access only the apps and content specified by the administrator managing the user. The administrator can restrict the user's contacts and website access, and place time limits on computer use.

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
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Sharing



Sharing-only users can access shared files remotely, but cannot log in to or change settings on the computer. To give the user permission to access your shared files or screen, you may need to change settings in the File Sharing, Screen Sharing, or Remote Management panes of Sharing preferences.

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
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Group



A "group" allows multiple users to have the same access privileges. For example, you can grant a group specific access privileges for a folder or a file, and all members of the group have access. You can also assign a group specific access privileges for each of your shared folders. You control a group's access to your shared folders by setting access permissions in the File Sharing section of Sharing preferences.





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
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
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Guest



Guest users can use your computer temporarily without you having to add them as individual users. You can set restrictions so guests can access only the items you want to share. Files created by a guest are stored in a temporary folder, but this folder and its contents are deleted when the guest logs out. The guest account works with the Find My Mac feature of iCloud, which can help you find your Mac if you lose it. You can locate your Mac if someone finds it, logs in as a guest, then uses Safari to access the Internet.

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
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
Creating Secure Passwords

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Password protecting your Mac is essential to help secure the data it contains. More complex passwords are more secure, but can be more difficult to create and remember. Fortunately, OS X gives you tools to assist with this.

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


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Creating Secure Passwords

Keychain Access



The password used to sign in to your user account is also used to unlock your login keychain. The login keychain is where passwords are stored in OS X. Viewing passwords and other information stored in your login keychain is done in the application Keychain Access.



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
